in the past, considerable work was performed for the Attorney General in apprehending violators of the Martin Fraudulent Securities Act. Inspections of places of public assembly for the Industrial Commission have continued on a large scale. July 1st, 1925, all certificates of compliance with the provisions of the Labor Law relating to these places have been issued by this Department instead of by the Industrial Commissioner which has considerably simplified the former procedure and eliminated duplication of effort. Over 20,000 places of public assembly have been inspected during the four and a half years that this act has been in existence. Among other activities in which this Department has assisted are the conducting of a school for the instruction of two hundred Motor Vehicle Inspectors, the examining of seven hundred candidates for police or semi-police positions by the Civil Service Commission, the conducting of schools of instruction for police in various cities and other State Police forces, drafting the present traffic code of the City of Troy, and drafting the preparation of an elementary course in civics for the Juvenile Grange of the State of New York.

In spite of the constant increase in the work of this Department, owing to rigid economy, expenditures last year did not exceed those of the previous one. For the next fiscal year an appropriation for maintenance and operation has been requested \$43,000 less than that for the present one. The entire cost to the State remains only slightly over seven dollars (\$7.00) per day per man, this including every expense, salaries, rental, equipment, food, travel, light, heat, communication, medical care and examinations,

pensions and incidentals.

The New York State School for Police has continued to broaden its scope. At the last session two weeks were added to the former four weeks' course with great benefit to those attending. This school which was founded by Lieutenant Colonel George F. Chandler as the first of its kind in the country has developed along his ideas under the splendid supervision of its director, Lieutenant-Inspector Albert B. Moore, into one which is widely known among police departments throughout a large part of the country. Representatives from various other state, city and village police forces have attended in increasing numbers until at the session which is to open on January 18th, over one hundred law enforcing officers not connected with this Department will be enrolled in addition to the ninety troopers who have been detailed to attend. Owing to the unselfish co-operation of the many authorities on police work who have given their services as instructors, the total expense for the last session was only \$1,415.00.

The standard of horsemanship and marksmanship has reached a higher plane than ever before. At the Syracuse State Fair when the six troops compete for the various trophies which are awarded for special excellence, the Chandler Trophy for horsemanship was won by Troop C, the Newayo Cup for marksmanship by Troop G, and the Jockey Club Cup for the troop winning the

greatest number of points at the horse show during the State Fair was awarded jointly to Troop A and Troop C, these troops

having tied in the different classes.

Each year shows more and more the soundness of the principles laid down by Lieutenant-Colonel George F. Chandler when he organized the New York State Troopers and the loyalty to them of every officer, non-commissioned officer and trooper to whom is due the credit for the esteem in which the Department is held by the people of this State.

The spirit which has made possible the record here recounted is well typified in the following article which appeared last winter

in the Oneonta Star:

AMONG THE STATE TROOPERS

On the editorial page of the New York Herald-Tribune of Tuesday there is a complimentary notice which will be read with interest by every resident of Otsego, Delaware and Chenango Counties, and moreover by every reader of the Star, since the matters concerning Troop "C" of the State Constabulary, to which it refers, were first printed in the


columns of this paper. Says the Herald-Tribune:

"The members of the constabulary did not avail themselves of the hibernation which the recent blizzards which buried the Oneonta country invited. At the height of the worst storm, Captain Fox, in the comfortable barracks of Troop "C", at Sidney, ordered two saddlebags filled with provisions and set out through the drifts with four of his troopers. The horses barely made their way over the road that led to isolated Pine Hill farm. For the last mile the Troopers

had to dismount and break a path for the horses.

"Pushing their way into the kitchen of the farmhouse they found its lone occupant, Mrs. Evelyn L. Schmidt, almost starved and almost frozen. Captain Fox had been picturing something of the sort in the snug barracks at Sidney. Food and warmth supplied, the troopers returned to Sidney. They came back the next day through the drifts with a winter's store of provisions and chopped a pile of wood to last for months. 'And if any one wants to know,' said the Oneonta Star, 'what kind of men the State Troopers are,' Mrs. Schmidt has requested that all inquiries be referred to her and she'll tell 'em.''




